2. "Twig — Rider from the Sea"



I Covering the paper with pale colours

I use a sandy-coloured support that doesn't interfere with the quantity of pastel I put on the paper. A smooth covering is essential so that the pastels blend well. Covering the whole paper with the palest colours, I work down to the umbers for the sand. I blend them all carefully, keeping the bands of colour defined.



3 Develop the waves and twig

I tackle the finer details of the waves next, cresting them with the lightest greens and whites. Using dashes of bright greens for light. I make sure the foam is running downhill with the flow. I create more movement in the foreground sand and more definition in the pools, then dot in the structure of the branches using a small conté crayon.



5 Adding the finishing touches

Now that all essentials are in place, I check all parts of the painting including the highlights on the waves, the darker under-waves, foam, shadows and lastly the reflections. These are reflections and not shadows, therefore they only reflect in the wet parts of the sand. Before it is completed, I do a little refining on the branch itself with a few highlights.



2 Establishing the waves and shoreline

Using a deep green/grey for the inside of the waves, I turn to Davy's Greys nearer the shoreline. I put in the darkest greens for the back waves, thinking of the direction they'll be running. It's important to get the waves lapping in gently, so I only use suggestions of colour. It's always lighter between the waves, so I use a pale Payne's Grey and blend with the stream direction to give movement.



4 Refining the waves and twig

With the complete outline gently dotted in, I go over the twig branches with a dark conté crayon. I'm conscious of the weight in the branches, and I take care to make them look as if they were part of a growing tree. This twig was once part of an ash tree with its slender elegant branches. Using greens, greys and umbers I further detail the waves, watery sand and shoreline.
