An Exhibition of Photographs, celebrating 50 years of Tom's Galway Advertiser newspaper column.

Forty-five Galway City images from the 19th and 20th centuries.

Curated by local historian Tom Kenny, the images depict a social history of Galway city in the late 19th and 20th centuries. Photographs of various city streets including Quay Street and Cross Street, market scenes, old shops and residences, workers, sporting activities and transport are all represented.

Tom Kenny has been a local historian in Galway for most of his life and this year sees the celebration of his fiftieth year writing weekly Old Galway columns on the city's history for the Galway Advertiser newspaper. He also co-hosts a weekly Old Galway Diary podcast together with Ronnie O'Gorman.

The exhibition will be launched at 3pm on Saturday, August 12th by Mayor of Galway city, Cllr Eddie Hoare and all are welcome. The exhibition is being funded by Galway City Council.

Tom Kenny's Old Galway will run from Saturday August 12th-29th at The Kenny Gallery, Liosbán Retail Park, Tuam Road, Galway (open Monday-Saturday 9am-5pm). A selection of the images are for sale.

In the late sixties we converted a premises at the end of High Street to a shop full of old maps and prints. These were regarded as important historical documents but photographs had not, as yet, achieved that status. It did not take us long to realise that we could categorise them as such. Maurice Semple's first book pointed that out forcefully.

In 1970, Ronnie O'Gorman set up the Galway Advertiser and we often discussed old photographs. He regarded them as nostalgia, which was fair enough in those days. Then he printed some and was impressed with the public's response, so I got some more together and he began to publish one every week together with a caption.

And so, the 'Old Galway' collection began to grow. I began to search institutional collections to source material and many in this exhibition come from these sources. I would like to thank The National Library, Galway County Library, The Jesuit Archive, Chetham Library in Manchester, The Ulster Museum, The Hulton Getty Collection, The Library of Congress in Washington, The Dúchas Collection, Galway City Museum for their support down through the years. In addition, hundreds of Galwegians have presented me with images from their scrapbooks, albums, shoe boxes in the attic, their private collections etc. while others have sent me material from abroad. I am grateful to each and every one of you.

These photographs are deceptively simple evocations of humble activities, of street happenings, of markets and fairs, of people at work and at play. The images are not contrived but true and candid visions of Galway that mirror the mindset of the day. There is no quaint posing for the camera, indeed, all the subjects are comfortable and natural going about their daily business. These are important documents of social history, evocations of times past and information carriers for future generations.

Enter into these photographs. Immerse yourself in their silent dream and their speechless meditation. Reflect on those who reflect you.

I am most grateful to the Galway Advertiser for giving me the vehicle to pass these images on to its readers, and I am especially thankful to Galway City Council for sponsoring this collection. A special thank you to Dean Kelly for his help and support with this collection.
